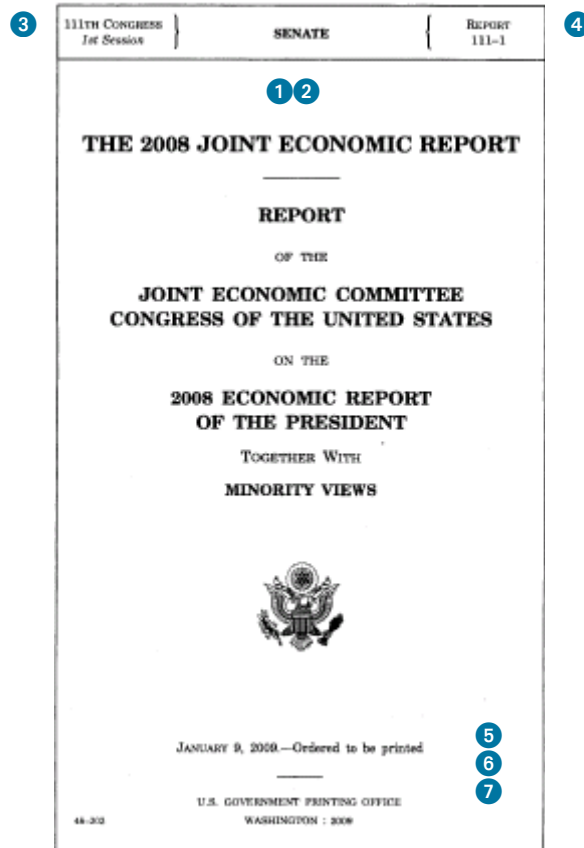

**Parenthetical Reference:**

Place parenthetical references at the ends of your sentences. When the document is better referred to by its long title, use a fragment of the title in your reference—enough of a fragment to differentiate the document from others in your works-cited list. Use the beginning part of the title. Be sure to notice that there's no comma between the title fragment and the page number:
